he Gaviota Coast is not just a stretch of land and coastline; it's our shared heritage and a source of inspiration for all who call this place home. The rural character of the Coast and its mountains is the finest expression of the Southern California Mediterranean environment. A place where the past, present, and future converge. So, what is the Conservancy doing today to shape the future of the Gaviota Coast?

The Conservancy's plans include establishing a native plant nursery for large-scale restoration projects and the creation of conservation easements on private lands. These initiatives enhance the region's internationally recognized ecological diversity.

Agriculture is an essential component of the Coast's vitality. The Conservancy funded a vermiculture (worm farming) project on a local ranch to demonstrate to ranchers the productivity vermicast provides to local crops. We have underwritten large-scale compost application on rangeland of several

ranches to invigorate the soil. GCC funded a 1.13 acre demonstration coffee plantation (the first crop is this year) to evaluate the economic potential of this new local crop.

Recreation and public access are essential components of developing community awareness and appreciation of our coastal environment and we continue to develop easements for the California Coast Trail along some of the bluff-top properties.

We actively monitor land use issues on the Coast to ensure that any development is consistent with County and State regulations. Our involvement in the County's Gaviota Coast Plan, spanning a decade from inception to approval, safeguards the coast from inappropriate development and preserves the public's view of mountain and coastal landscapes.

The conservation initiatives we undertake aren't just for us; they're a legacy for our children and the generations to come. Our actions today will shape tomorrow's future. Join us ... the future is now for the making.

How Do Conservation Easements Benefit Landowners?



onservation easements are a powerful tool for landowners seeking to protect the natural beauty and ecological integrity of their property for future generations. But what exactly is a conservation easement, and how do landowners benefit from it?

A conservation easement is a legally binding agreement between a landowner and a conservation organization or government agency. This agreement places restrictions on land use to preserve its conservation values, such as open space, wildlife habitat, scenic views, or historic landmarks.

The primary benefit for landowners is the assurance that their property will be conserved in perpetuity, aligning with their environmental values and creating a lasting legacy. Importantly, land under a conservation easement remains privately owned, allowing landowners to continue residing on and managing the property while safeguarding its natural features.

Conservation easements can offer financial advantages. They may qualify for tax incentives, including federal

income tax deductions and potential property tax reductions. By limiting development on the land, the property's value may decrease, leading to lower property taxes and reducing the financial burden on landowners.

Additionally, conservation easements contribute to the broader community by preserving natural landscapes and enhancing the quality of life for everyone. It's a win-win situation: landowners get to protect their cherished properties while enjoying potential financial benefits, and the broader community benefits from the preservation of natural landscapes and a higher quality of life. This symbiotic relationship between landowners and the community ensures the long-term protection of our natural treasures.

Safeguarding Our Coast: GCC and Partners Defeat Exxon's Valve Upgrade Project

In a pivotal battle to protect the Gaviota Coast, GCC and its partners triumphed over Exxon's Valve Upgrade Project. For now, this remarkable victory safeguards the County's environment and its residents from the dire consequences of another oil spill.

Background and Overview:

Plains Lines 901 and 903 extend along the Gaviota Coast and were the sites of a catastrophic oil spill in 2015. Line 901 ruptured, spilling an estimated 451,500 gallons of heavy crude oil into the Pacific Ocean, devastating the coastline and harming marine life.

The spill's cause was corrosion of the pipeline, which led to Plains being held criminally liable and facing substantial penalties and fines. These pipelines were subsequently purchased by Exxon, who sought approval for the Valve Upgrade Project to resume oil operations.

A Hard-Fought Battle:


GCC appealed the approval of the Valve Upgrade Project, along with Gaviota Coast landowners directly affected by the project. After rigorous public hearings, the Planning Commission voted to deny the project, citing its



detrimental impact on the environment and community. Exxon appealed this denial to the County Board of Supervisors, and in August the Board voted 2-2 on the appeal, resulting in no action, effectively a defeat for Exxon.

iodiversity thrives on the Gaviota Coast, sheltering species like the elusive California tiger salamander and the threatened Western snowv plover. Abundant marine life can be found beneath the Pacific's surface. in a vibrant marine ecosystem home to kelp forests, sea otters, and blue whales. The Gaviota Coast is a migratory haven along the Pacific Flyway, offering nesting grounds for seabirds like the Western gull and the Black Oystercatcher. The unique flora of coastal chaparral and oak woodlands features rare and endemic plants, such as the Gaviota tarplant, found nowhere else.

In the face of climate change, the coast serves as a buffer, with its wetlands absorbing water and providing

resilience against sea-level rise. Beyond beauty, the Gaviota Coast supplies clean water, supports pollinators, and combats climate change through carbon sequestration.

The Coast has been a source of inspiration, recreation, and livelihood for generations, reinforcing its importance.
